GWST 1501 9.00A INTRODUCTION TO GENDER & WOMEN'S STUDIES

<u>Term</u>: SU, May 4 – August 5, 2015

Time: FULLY ON-LINE

This 1000-level course offered in Gender and Women's Studies and is part of the Faculty of Liberal Arts & Professional Studies Foundation Program. Besides it thematic content, this course partly focuses on basic university skills. It has a 9.00 credit value and may be taken to fulfill students' General Education requirements.

This course is an interdisciplinary introduction to Gender and Women's Studies. It considers historical and contemporary arguments to develop understandings of how social, political and economic realities shape gender relations at multiple intersections. It introduces diverse theoretical approaches within feminist scholarship to outline broad terms of debate, and works with these to investigate specific feminist arguments in regard to written and visual representations and a range of socio-political issues. In addition, the course helps students to develop critical reading and analysis.

GWST 3555 6.00A GENEALOGIES OF FEMINIST THEORIZING

Examines major feminist theoretical approaches, both historical and contemporary, in women's and gender studies. Students will develop their analytic skills by engaging in rigorous critique and debate of feminist theorizing. Students will write detailed assessments of specific theoretical feminist approaches that take into consideration difference and intersectionality.

ANTHROPOLOGY

AP/ANTH 2170 6.00A SEX, GENDER AND THE BODY

<u>Term</u>: S1, May 4 – June 15, 2015

Time: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday & Friday, 10:30am-12:30pm (plus 4 tutorials)

This course critically examines popular explanations of what is considered natural (and what is not) about sex, gender, emotions and the family. Through a cross-cultural approach, biological models of natural gender roles, as well as sexual and familial relations, are explored and questioned.

HUMANITIES

AP/HUMA 1950 6.00A CONCEPTS OF MALE AND FEMALE IN THE WEST

Term: SU, May 4 - August 5, 2015

Time: Tuesday & Thursday, 5:00 - 8:00pm

An examination of the origins of, and the interrelationships among, gender, male and female concepts and roles through myth, literature, art and artifacts from various Western cultures, past and present

AP/HUMA 3970 3.00A SCIENCE & GENDER IN MOD. WESTERN CULTURE

An analysis of the nature of the physical sciences in the 20th century. Case studies may be drawn from astronomy, chemistry, physics and the earth sciences.

HUMAN RIGHTS AND EQUITY STUDIES

AP/HREQ 1700 6.00A WOMEN IN CANADA

<u>Term</u>: SU, May 4 – July August 5, 2015 <u>Time</u>: Tuesday & Friday, 2:30 – 5:30pm

This course will provide an overview of Canadian women's evolving roles and their response to these roles as both cause and product of changing economic, social and cultural conditions. We will examine such things as woman's changing role in the family and workplace and the rise of the women's movement.

AP/HREQ 1920 6.00A MALE-FEMALE RELATIONSHIPS

<u>Term</u>: SU, May 4 – August 5, 2015

<u>Time</u>: Monday & Wednesday, 10:30am – 12:30pm (plus 6 tutorials)

This course explores some of the basic issues which influence male-female relationships and experience in Western society. Property, sexuality, socialization and culture are considered with attention to the social science literature in these areas as well as contemporary expressions in male-female relationships.

LINGUISTIC

AP/LING 2410 3.00A LANGUAGE AND GENDER

<u>Term</u>: S2, June 22 – August 12, 2015

<u>Time</u>: Tuesday & Thursday, 4:00 – 7:00pm

This course explores the relationship between language and sex/gender systems from a feminist perspective. The main areas investigated are language and gender stereotypes; language, power and women's status; and male versus female communicative style in different socio-cultural contexts.

SOCIOLOGY

AP/SOCI 4070 6.00A SOCIOLOGY OF THE BODY

Term: SU May 4 – August 5, 2015

Time: FULLY ON-LINE

AP/SOCI 4685 6.00A FEMINIST PERSPECTIVES ON FAMILIES

<u>Term</u>: S1, May 4 – June 15, 2015

Time: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday, 8:30-11:30am

This course focuses on four major theoretical feminist perspectives on families, gender and the state. Exploring issues such as regulation of sexuality, division of labour and income, violence, childcare, and reproduction of race and class.
